CREAGER ENTERS CONGRESSIONAL RACE

aying "People can't trust Democrats and Republicans in Congress anymore," a Burtonsville resident entered the eighth Congressional District race as a Libertarian. Robert Creager, 46, filed papers with SABEL today to be placed on the March 5 primary ballot. In announcing his campaign, Creager said, "If the people in the eighth district really want lower taxes, and less federal government I'm the only choice. The Democrats and Republicans have a 100 year track record of more taxes and bigger government."

Creager said as the campaign unfolds, he will focus on five main themes. "First, we must bring down the deficit with spending cuts, not new taxes on working

people and senior citizens." Creager said his 5 themes will include cutting the deficit, reducing the military budgets to reflect the end of the cold war, reforming welfare, fighting violent crime, and making health care affordable for everybody.

Creager lives with his wife Jane and children Ananda, Jennifer, and Robert in Burtonsville. He earned a BS in Management from University of Maryland, and will receive his MBA this month. He is a senior staff member for

BDM, a systems integration company headquartered in McLean, Virginia.

State Denies Creager Ballot Access

"Libertarians demand fair

obert Creager, Libertarian Congressional Candidate for the 8th district was denied ballot access by the state board of Elections of Maryland this past December. Although Creager filed all of

the necessary papers and fees, the State refused to accept his Libertarian candidacy. According to the LP State Chair, Jesse Markowitz, Democrats and Republicans who

filed papers have been qualified by the state. Markowitz said "Libertarians demand fair and uniform treatment." The ACLU has agreed to take his case to court

based on the May 1995 US Supreme Court decision issued in *US Term Limits vs Thornton*. In that ruling, the court ruled that states can regulate election "procedures," but cannot impose "qualifications."

"This is a direct attack on the people's right to choose who they want representing them," said Creager. "By denying Libertarians the same right to get on the ballot that the Democrats

and Republicans have, the state is discriminating against an entire class of people."

DC Activist Elected

At a meeting of the Logan Circle Advisory Neighborhood Commission last night, Commissioner David Morris was unanimously elected to chair the local governmental body representing more than 13,200 people in central Washington, DC.

Morris beat an incumbent when he was elected to represent his single-member district in 1994. He is the treasurer of the Libertarian Party of the District of Columbia and a leader in the District's successful term limits campaign.

At last night's meeting, his colleagues representing other neighborhoods making up that part of D.C. from the Capitol Mall to R Street, NW between 9th and 15th Streets NW, elected him to lead their jurisdiction.


District 8 Primary

WHEN SHOULD VIOLENCE BE INITIATED?

A Minority View

I've always argued that immorality is the root cause By Walter E Williams of most of our great social and economic problems.

Let's put my argument in another light by going to first principles and asking: What's the moral basis for initiation of violence by either a person or government?

Part of the answer is simple and has a broad consensus: A person is morally justified to use violence when another initiates violence against his person or his property. Self-defense is one of those

"unalienable rights." -Governments represent people's efforts to collectively provide self-defense. authorize governments to carry out our natural right of self-defense. The only legitimate purpose for government initiation violence and threats is to prevent or punish those who'd use it against others. granting government a new monopoly on the use of

violence, more order is created, and there's less preying upon the weak by the strong. The bottom line is moral government use of force cannot have a purpose exceeding private use of force.

Let's examine this generality and ask: Do people have the right to rape, murder or steal? Fortunately, most Americans would answer no, but the next question poses a problem. Is there a moral basis for granting government officials the right to rape, murder or steal? Most Americans would give a no answer for rape, but they'd be speaking with a forked tongue if they said they were against government murder or theft.

"Doggone it, Williams," you say. "You've just insulted the entire nation." Let's look at it. Do people have a moral right to take someone else's money, by threats or force, for themselves or to give to someone

else? If they don't have the moral right to do so privately, how can they grant government that right?

You say, "Government programs like welfare, Medicare and farm handouts aren't the same as theft; they're a result of a democratic process." Such a position differs little from saying that acts, clearly immoral when done privately, become moral and perhaps even laudatory when done by government.

The moral bankruptcy of that position becomes clear if we apply it to rape. Some might object to my calling welfare, Medicare and farm handouts theft and prefer to delude themselves calling them income redistribution. That being the case, might we give sanction to government-sponsored rape by renaming it "compassion" redistribution?

Next: Suppose I want to manage my own retirement needs and resolutely refuse to pay into Social Security. The first moral question you might

ask is: Have I initiated violence or the threat of violence toward anyone? The answer is a clear no.

Then, if I have not initiated violence and threats toward anyone, what is the moral basis for threats and violence being initiated against me? Plus, if I resolutely refuse to obey Social Security mandates and refuse to submit to fines, property confiscation and arrests, the

ultimate penalty will be death at the hands of government. Some might argue that government initiation of violence is just deserts for disobedience; however, laws do not necessarily establish morality, as is clearly demonstrated by the Fugitive Slave Act, Nazi anti-Semitic laws and South Africa's former apartheid laws.

The founders of our nation, clinging to the selfevidence of "certain unalienable rights," risked execution for treason and went to war with Britain for tyrannical acts of Parliament and King George that pale in comparison to today's tyrannical acts of Congress. Today's tolerance of tyranny highlights a danger of democracy, namely, tyrannical acts assume an aura of moral legitimacy when there's a majoritarian process.

Opportunity Knocks: Ballot Access Reform

ince last I wrote, 1996 arrived, and the portent of struggle seemed to ride the winds of the great blizzard that shut down the federal government, even when the politicians wouldn't. The looming battle may well decide the most crucial question for the coming century: whether Americans choose Brand A or B of Statism, or the path that promises the ultimate return of prodigal America, triumphant and free.

For the Libertarian Party of Maryland, the first battle of the campaign has already begun, with the reintroduction of the Fair Ballot Access bill. Last year it failed by a single vote, and it has an excellent chance to pass this time. If it does, permanent ballot access will be one step closer, and the next century could well see the LP's star rising. Imagine the GOP and the Democrats fighting it out for second place in the hearts of Americans, and

smile.

Club of Two, as I'll call it, has erected barriers to newcomers that the current members never have to surmount, because it's their Club and their rules, see. Humor me now, as I try to explain those rules calmly, without damaging my keyboard.

The first thing an aspiring political party needs is legal recognition as a qualified non-primary party. We achieved this status again this year when 10,000 registered Maryland voters agreed to sign a petition stating, in effect, the LP is worthy of legality. Once the State validated the 10,000th signature, we won the right (a) to ballot access for our Presidential candidate, and (b) to register voters, at the cost of desperately needed funds and near-exhaustion of our activists. Note that the State LP has gained ballot access for exactly none of

its candidates at this point, a fact that elludes many who, like me, assumed that when the national Party organization trumpeted its gain of Maryland ballot status, state Party candidates had *ipso facto* earned the same right. Not so! We at the state level have another, much steeper hill to climb before we can play with the big kids.

There is but One Way to get, and stay, on the ticket permanently, and it applies to presidential candidates as well: if 10% of Maryland's registered voters are registered Libertarians. The exact number needed now can't be pinned down precisely, but in the '92 Presidential election it was exactly 246,301. (How difficult is that? Suffice to say we didn't come close, and if we make it this year the champagne is on

me). If we somehow beat the odds by registering a quarter million people who mostly have never heard of us, the Party and *all* its candidates will

have *permanent* ballot access—no more petition drives, or registration drives, even if we never win a seat. And, we will have achieved *primary party* status, meaning we have the right to hold primary elections. Herein lies our Catch 22: the primary system acts to perpetuate our non-primary status, because in order to vote in a party's primary the voter must register *in that party*!

Now, with the exception of the presidential candidate, LP candidates for partisan district-level and state-wide offices may still get on the ballot, by getting 3% of registered voters in their district (the district being the whole state for state-wide offices, etc.) to sign -- here we go again—another petition. If they succeed they get one-time ballot access, which has no bearing on the ballot status

of the Party as a whole.

However, we can at least avoid the 10,000 signatures requirement in '98 so that our 10% registration drive can continue uninterrupted, and preserve ballot access for our Presidential candidate in 2000, if we meet yet another requirement: receive at least 3% of the total of all votes cast for all state-wide offices, including national (President, US Senate) and state-level offices (Governor, Comptroller, Attorney General). This year, a once-in-twelve-years situation arises: just one state-wide office-the Presidency - is up for grabs. important, because in two out of three Presidential elections there are two statewide contests (including one US Senator, while in non-Presidential statewide elections there are either three or four depending on whether a US Senate seat is contested. In '98 four offices will be contested. candidate(s), whether we have one or four, will then need four times as many votes to meet the test. To illustrate: if 2 million voters each voted in all four contests, the aggregate LP vote would have to be 240,000 (3% of 8 million). Four LP candidates, then, would have to average 60,000 votes each. At the other extreme, a single candidate would have to draw all 240,000 votes to pass the test. Furthermore, we'd lose what we've gained if we ever fail this test in the future before achieving permanent ballot access.

Confused? Well, passage of the 1996 Fair Ballot Access bill, introduced again by the Hon. Paul Pinsky in the State Senate, will at least simplify the law. It would lower the 3% voter petition signature requirement for *independent* candidates to 0.5%, which is in line with the national average (note that the ACLU considers 0.1% to be a reasonable upper limit), and eliminate that requirement entirely for qualified non-primary parties (like ours).

Therefore the imperative: we must do all we can to help the Pinsky bill succeed! We've begun by joining the Coalition for a Democratic Maryland, which consists

The Secret of the League by Ernest Bramah

"Randians will appreciate the

similarity of The Secret of the

League to Atlas Shrugged."

he Secret of the League is a visionary tale of what happens when a free society takes a turn toward socialism. Ernest Bramah, son of a prominent businessman. disturbed at the leftward movement of his beloved England in 1907, and wrote this novel to illustrate where England could be a decade later, should this trend continue.

With uncanny foresight, the author wrote of a government becoming ever more intrusive, pitting class against class, and imposing taxes on productive businesses, ultimately driving them out of existence. The result was to coerce the working class into total dependence on the largesse of their government. (Sound familiar?)

Soon, Bramah introduces the plot element that has drawn so many comparisons to Ayn Rand's Atlas

The protagonists are Sir John Hampden, a well-respected non-aligned politician, and naval hero Captain Stobalt, who uses the pseudonym George Salt (rhymes with Galt, get it?). Together they join to form an alliance to fight the corrupted system. First taking on the powerful coal mining unions by organizing a massive boycott, they eventually set into motion a chain of events which would ultimately topple the anti-capitalist parties that permeated the novel's version of 1918 English politics.

The archaic language and slang of early 20th century England made reading this novel somewhat of a chore. However, contributor Daniel Jencka does an admirable job of explaining some of the more obscure vernacular by adding a glossary in this revival of the long out of print novel.

Aside from the language of the times, the author tells his story very effectively, peppering it with typically dry British humor.

Mr. Bramah had great insight into a society totally dependent on government for its sustenance. To spread information to its members, the League employs a fictional device

called the telescribe, which is remarkably similar to the modern-day fax machine.

Randians will appreciate the similarity of *The Secret of the League* to *Atlas Shrugged*. Although there has been some controversy as to whether Rand copied Bramah's ideas, there is no evidence that Rand actually read the earlier work.

With today's American leaders interpreting constitutional principles to fit their needs, passing repressive laws, and bowing to special interests, the turn of events described in *The Secret of the League* has many modern-day implications. The prophetic Mr. Bramah could just as well have been looking across the century into the future of contemporary United States. Many parallels could be drawn from his story—from the confiscatory nature of today's taxes to using starving women and children as emotional battering rams to further their agenda.

But will we heed his warning?



which consists of civil rights and civic groups, and other minor parties seeking reform of the current law. And, notably, the ACLU has agreed to assist our own Bob Creager in challenging the current law, pursuant to his campaign to unseat Rep. Connie Morella. Beyond that, each of us can do much to help:



1. Register in the LP now!

- 2. Write to your State Senator and Delegates, and implore them to cosponsor, then vote for, the Pinksy Fair Ballot Access bill. You don't need to mention party affiliation, just say that you're a constituent who opposes the current law on whatever grounds you choose to mention. And mention that the bill has broad-based support and ACLU backing.
- 3. Write letters to editors in local publications.
- **4. Call your favorite political talk show** and lobby for this vital legislation.
- **5. Show this article** to your Republican and Democrat acquaintances.
- **6.** Chances are they are totally unaware of and outraged by the draconian nature of this law, and wind up supporting our effort to change it.
- 7. Encourage any civic organizations, church groups, or any other politically active associations to join the Coalition.
- 8. Finally, ask sympathetic friends if they'd consider registering in the LP to help us achieve ballot access. Point out that they could still vote for any Party's candidate in the general election, although they would forfeit the opportunity to vote in the primaries.

Imagine, if you will, the plush feel of the leather-bound chairs, the smell of fresh paint on the sign that reads "Libertarians: Welcome to The Club!". An older member, with grudging admiration, greats you: "Put your feet up, friend, and relax. You have paid your dues."

It's time, ladies and gentleman, to realize that dream.
